"Wild Child": Roadmap for Managing Children with Challenging Behaviors

- Consider **rating scales** to help clarify what *underlying* problems may be present, as well as to guide future treatment. Any specific problems could then be addressed specifically.
 - PHQ-9 for depression
 - o <u>SCARED</u>(or <u>SCARED parent</u> for young kids) for anxiety
 - <u>ACE/PEARLS checklist (parent/caregiver) ACE/PEARLS Teen (self-report)</u> for possible trauma exposure
 - <u>Child PTSD Symptom Scale (CPSS)</u> (unless the ACE score is 'zero')
 - <u>Child Mania Rating Scale (CMRS)</u> (if there are wild mood swings and/or concern that the child has clinical depression and/or there is a family hx of bipolar disorder and/or considering prescribing an anti-depressant [as all of them could induce manic symptoms]). <u>CMRS scoring tips</u>

- Referral for **psychotherapy:** It is likely that individual and family sessions will be necessary.
- Regarding **psychotropic medication**:
 - These may be considered to treat specific comorbid conditions (such as anxiety or depression).
 - For severe aggression resulting in danger towards self or others, psychiatric hospitalization and/or mood-stabilizing medication may be indicated.
 - Coach patient/caregivers that medication is not going to automatically 'make' a kid be more respectful/happy/agreeable and isn't going to prevent a kid from making outrageous threats to peers/teachers/etc.
 - The treatment for oppositional/conduct disorder symptoms (arguing, lying, blaming others, threats to harm others) is largely *behavioral*.
- If the current symptoms are causing problems in the school setting, the caregiver could request that the school develop an **Individual Education Plan (IEP)** so that any needed accommodations can be put in place.
- Aggressive kids should not be exposed to **aggressive media** (movies, video games, etc.). (Actually, no kids should be exposed to this!)
